R.I. medical distributor to fulfill \$9 million in U.S. Army orders

A Warwick medical equipment distributor will be fulfilling \$9 million in new orders to the U.S. military.

CME Corp. says that across two separate orders, it will deliver wellness products to 10 military bases across the country. CME will supply around 60,000 pieces of equipment — that's 1,800 pallets of products — to U.S. Army Wellness Centers at 10 bases nationwide.

Army Wellness Centers aim to to improve individual troop and unit health, performance and readiness. The products the centers will receive include diagnostic, physical therapy, and exercise equipment; medical treatment aids and supplies; firearms simulator training software; and mental acuity software, CME said in a news release.

The privately held CME bills itself as the nation's top source for healthcare equipment, turnkey logistics, and biomedical services. It represents over 2 million products from more than 2,000 manufacturers, and serves hospital systems, surgery centers, the government and more.

The company maintains corporate offices in Rhode Island and California. A CME spokeswoman did not immediately respond to a request for information about the company's annual revenues and headcount.

CME is working through Martek Global Services Inc., the primary contractor, in its latest U.S. Army fulfillment venture. Deliveries will be made to military bases in Arizona, Georgia, Kansas, Louisiana, New York, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas, and Washington.

“With CME's direct-to-site, white glove delivery services, these health centers will be able to continue to offer peak efficiencies at

the bases, which is so crucial for force protection,” said Robert Charron, CME’s manager of government sales, in a statement.
